Survey for Indoor Tennis Facilities

Every year as outdoor temperatures begin to cool, thoughts turn to indoor tennis. Kingston's only permanent indoor tennis facility closed over ten years ago, leaving KTC members with a long drive to the nearest indoor facilities in Belleville. The parent of one of our junior tennis campers expressed interest in exploring the possibility of the provision of these services by the City of Kingston; this enquiry and subsequent dialogue led to the formulation of a survey to gauge the potential demand for indoor tennis facilities. A link to this online survey was sent out in early September to the membership. Four days later, 146 responses had been received. Due to use restrictions by the free online survey tool, only 100 entries could be tabulated.

[Note: The original email inviting members to participate in the KTC survey incorrectly named the City of Kingston as being involved in the survey. We apologize for any confusion.]

Survey results are as follows:

Q1. If affordable indoor tennis courts became available in Kingston, would you be interested in playing tennis in the winter?

A1. Yes: 99% No: 1%

Q2. How important, in your opinion, is the availability of indoor tennis facilities in Kingston?

A2. Not important: 0% Somewhat important: 8% Important: 15% Very important: 77%

Q3. How important, in your opinion, is the availability of indoor tennis facilities for the development of athletic programs for youth in Kingston?

A3. Not important: 2% Somewhat important: 9% Important: 17% Very important: 72%

Q4. Do you know of other people (not members of the KTC), including youth and students, who would be interested in playing tennis indoors in the winter?

A4. Yes: 85% No: 15%

Q5. Provided that affordable indoor courts are available, how many times per week would you be interested in playing?

A5. 1x: 6% 2x: 33% 3x: 35% 4x: 8% More than 4x: 17% No response: 1%

Q6. How much would you expect (or be prepared) to pay for court rental indoors? Choose from the following options but try to be realistic!

A6. Less than \$15/hr: 16% \$15-20/hr: 38% \$20-25/hr: 19% \$25-30/hr: 14% \$30-40/hr: 11% More than \$40/hr: 1%

There are community-based tennis facilities that operate in conjunction with a municipality. An example includes the newly-constructed Youngs Sportsplex that hosts the Welland Indoor Tennis Club (www.youngssportsplex.com/index.php). KTC History by Paula Loh

The Mystery of the Clubhouse Location

You may have wondered why the clubhouse is located off to one corner of the property, as most facilities have the clubhouse at the entry point to the grounds. The answer lies in the history of the club. When the courts and clubhouse were constructed, the club's property included the three residential lots that lie to the north of Courts 1 & 7 and the clubhouse. You can see in the B&W film from the late 1920s that is on our website that there are cars parked in this area - Earl Street was the main entrance and the street address for the club. What happened?

Property transfer documents in the Queen's Archives hold the key. The lots fronting on Earl Street (187, 188, 189, 190), part of City Block 358, were severed and sold by the tennis club in 1942 and 1943 as three residential building lots. This presumably represents the initial sale of club assets in an attempt to overcome the financial difficulties from the Depression and the war years. The club received a total of \$1,600 in 1942/43 from these three sales. Ten years later, two of those three properties re-sold for \$12,850 and \$18,000, totalling \$30,850 (part of this increase in value would reflect the construction of homes on the lots). The sale of the remaining property of the tennis club to Queen's at the discounted price of \$6,613 followed in 1953.

Tournament Trophies

Back in the early days of the club, the KTC awarded tournament winners with their own miniature silver trophy. The trophy from 1926 is hallmarked as sterling silver, whereas the two from 1933 are not stamped. Ross MacLachlan found his grandfather's trophies stored away and forgotten in a cardboard box. The removal of almost a century's worth of black tarnish revealed the treasure hidden beneath the surface. Hopefully these are only the first of many pieces of KTC memorabilia that will be displayed in the new clubhouse.

The surface of Court 1 had become worn in places, creating a hazard for players when transitioning from one section to



another as there were different levels of traction. In June, this court was repainted, converting it from the least-desirable to the most-desirable court on which to play.

Men's and Women's Doubles Tournament

The Kingston Tennis Club held its annual Men's and Women's Doubles Championship on the July 12-14 weekend.

This year's Men's Doubles tournament was well-attended, with 11 teams participating. The Women's Doubles tournament had a roster of only 6 teams, partially due to injuries and conflicts with scheduled holidays. All ages were represented, with pairings including the father-son team of Jean and Philippe Côté, and high school tennis coach David Stocks partnered with teenager Emil Flavin. Special commendation goes to our club steward, Asia Zolnierczyk, who took up tennis only this summer and entered the tournament with partner, Isabelle Côté.

In the finals, Judy Karpinsky and Claire Tremblay rallied from a 5-1 opening-set deficit to win the Women's Doubles title, beating Lesley Furter and Christine Scott in straight sets, 7-5, 6-2.

Sam Faris and James Nearing won their second Men's Doubles championship, defeating Martin Arh and Dan Purdon in straight sets, 6-1, 7-6(3). It was the third consecutive Doubles title for James, who won with his brother, Andrew, last year.

Singles Tournament

The weather gods smiled upon us and provided pleasant conditions for the club's 2013 Singles Tournament, held on the weekend of August 16-18. Twenty competitors entered the Men's Singles, ten entered the Women's Singles, and there were six entries for the Men's Over-55 Round Robin. Participants' ages ranged from 16 to 85

years young, with some players having only picked up the sport in the past year. Valuable experience was gained by all, while having fun both on and off the courts.

Now in her eleventh year as a member at the club, Lesley Furter won her first Women's Singles title (6-4, 6-4) against last year's finalist and previous champion, France Couture. Jeff Neasmith returned to the championships this year to reclaim his title of 2010, defeating James Nearing in the Men's Singles (6-3, 7-6(4)). Jim Muzzin won the Men's Over-55 Round Robin - played to a pro set of ten games - in the final match against Graham Lord (7-1 (retired)).
